
Scott Brison is the Member of Parliament for Kings-Hants (Nova Scotia) and serves as the Liberal

Into No Man's Land: PTSD Awareness March through Bay of Quinte Riding



On Wednesday, August 13th, two men came walking through Quinte West on their way to CFB Trenton. They carried full military backpacks and a wooden cross. Steve Hartwig and Jason McKenzie left Victoria on June 23rd to walk across the country to bring awareness of PTSD (Post Traumatic Stress Disorder) and to focus on changing the perceptions and stigma encountered.

In three years, 50 soldiers who have committed suicide as a result of their tours of duty in

Afghanistan. The treatment that is available for PTSD is inadequate to address the needs of these members of the Canadian Forces. Otherwise there would not be the number of suicides. There has been a great reluctance on the part of the military to accept the condition in the first place and an even greater reluctance to provide adequate treatment.

Prime Minister Refuses to Take Action on Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women

OTTAWA – The Leader of the Liberal Party of Canada, Justin Trudeau, today issued the following statement on the Prime Minister's refusal to call a national inquiry into missing and murdered Indigenous women and girls:

"The staggering number of missing and murdered Indigenous women and girls in Canada is a national tragedy. The Prime Minister continues to demonstrate a tremendous lack of leadership and how out of touch he is with this issue and those deeply impacted by it.

"Mr. Harper is on the wrong side of history – the federal government must take urgent action to end this national tragedy. Despite repeated calls for a public inquiry from the families of victims, provincial governments, Indigenous communities, and international organizations, the Prime Minister and his government have repeatedly refused to call a public inquiry.

"Liberals have long stood with First Nations, Métis, and Inuit communities, and Canadians across the country, in calling for a full, public, transparent inquiry mandated to determine the causes of the nearly 1,200 missing and murdered Indigenous women and girls. National leadership and action are urgently needed if we are to put an end to this violence."

Tips for Going Green

- 1. Reducing water use is a good way to help do your part for the environment. The Provincial Government suggests that you check every faucet in your house to make sure that it is not leaking. A dripping faucet can leak as much as 100 litres of water over a 24-hour period. That is 3,000 litres a month. A leaking faucet is estimated to fill two swimming pools in one year.

Journalists for Human Rights and Loyalist College are proud to announce a new scholarship opportunity for emerging Aboriginal journalists in Ontario. The JHR and Loyalist College Aboriginal Reporters Scholarship will give two emerging Aboriginal journalists the opportunity to attend the Loyalist-Trent eight-week summer institute in



journalism. Scholarship recipients will study the fundamentals of reporting and technical journalism skills with students enrolled in the Trent-Loyalist Joint Major in Journalism. Scholarship recipients will be selected from a talented pool of candidates who have participated in community-based media training during JHR's Northern Ontario Initiative.

Legalization of Marijuana:

The facts if you please

The Liberal Party of Canada has endorsed a policy paper for the Legalization of marijuana. Here are some facts.

Marijuana will not be sold to children.

In Ontario the legal age to purchase cigarettes and alcohol is 19. The same age will be applied to the purchase of marijuana. The same procedure for buying cigarettes and alcohol will be applied to buying marijuana.

Zero tolerance and stiff penalties will be put in place for those either selling to children or smuggling across our borders.

For many children buying marijuana is the first time they come into contact with gangs and other aspects of organized crime.

Marijuana *grown in Canada* is currently being exchanged for guns, cocaine, heroin and other drugs, supporting drug cartels in Mexico, and Central and America.

While legalizing marijuana will not shut down those cartels, it will take a large percentage out of their money flow.

It will allow our resources to be redirected to guarding our borders against smuggling, and going after other components of organized crime.

The legalization of marijuana will add 3-4 billion to tax revenues based on 3 million annual users. (RAND's 2009 report.)

The legalization of marijuana will add jobs in areas such as sales, research, quality control, marketing, tourism and public education to name a few.

The Lancet the leading medical journal globally, has compared the harm of 20 drugs using a 0-3 scale to measure addiction. The results:

Heroine - 3.00	Barbiturates - 2.01	Amphetamine - 1.67
Cocaine - 2.37	Alcohol - 1.93	Cannabis - 1.51
Tobacco - 2.23	Benzodiazepines - 1.83	LSD - 1.23
		Ecstasy - 1.13
